Make a Dream Catcher with Andrea Compo. Andrea, a member of the Yakama Nation, will teach students the art of making their own personal dream catcher. The dream catcher attracts dreams as they flow by in the night. Good dreams pass through the catcher, bad dreams become entangled.

Take a tour of Maryhill's treasures with Vonda Chandler. Everyone loves Maryhill's outdoor sculpture and this walking tour of our most popular sculptural pieces has become a very popular activity. Join Vonda and explore the question, "what is a sculpture?"
